The next session for Women's Meeting will begin on 11th September, when Jason will conduct our opening service, followed by a fortnightly programme.









A short story from the Bible

#### RENOWNED MANCHESTER CHOIR TO SING IN OTLEY

THE Manchester Musical Director: Jill Henderson-Wild

The fabulous Manchester Chorale is coming to Otley for the first time on 28<sup>th</sup> October to perform a concert at the Bridge Church.

The choir was started and funded by the BBC in 1979 but has been independent since the late 1980's. Manchester Chorale has become one of the best-known names in the Sainsbury's Choir of the Year Competition with regular televised appearances in the final stages of the competition.

They perform regularly at the Bridgewater Halls in Manchester and sang frequently on BBC's Daily Service. In 2012 the choir sang with the wonderful Black Dyke Band and performed the world premiere of Karl Jenkins Peacemakers as well as making regular broadcasts on Radio 3 and Radio 2.

In 2020 they gave a performance of Will Todd's "Mass in Blue" at St Margaret's church Prestwich to a packed house, accompanied by a 5-piece jazz band. This was the last concert before the Covid-19 lockdown.

The Bridge Church is very pleased to welcome the choir as David Robinson, the Deputy Musical Director and Accompanist of the choir, is the son of Judy Roberts and it is through his visits to the church that the idea of the concert came about.

Tickets for the concert at the Bridge Church will cost  $\pounds 12.00$  if bought on the door but just  $\pounds 10.00$  if bought in advance.

The doors will open at 7.00pm and the Concert starts at 7.30pm

#### **BRIDGE CHURCH BROWNIES**

This year Brownies have been working well at their 6 challenges which are:

- Take Action;
- •Know Myself;
- Express Myself;
- Futures skills;
- •Be well; and
- Have adventures.

For this they needed to carry out four skill builders, one interest badge and three hours of unit meeting activities. From September we worked towards the Have Adventure challenge where we learnt about camping and campfire skills.

The interest badges for this challenge were Archaeology, Aviation and Space. We ended the term with starting a campfire without matches and cooking marshmallows, with the assistance of the scout leaders Ian and Les. We had a great evening as six Brownies made their Promise.

After half-term we moved on to the Know Myself challenge and the skill builder was all about first aid. The interest badges were Collection and My Rights. For this we visited the toy museum in Ilkley where we did a quiz as we went round. It was an amazing look at toys over the years for teddy bears to cars.

In this half-term we were assisted by Hilary Eveleigh in learning carols for a concert and tombola raising funds for our Brownie pack on the first week in advent. Which gained the Brownies their performance badge. Brownies then finished the term with making Christmas decorations and cards.

At the start of 2023 we began our Express Myself Challenge in which the skill builders included learning the sign language alphabet, the phonetic alphabet (Charlie Bravo) and making a new emoji.

For some of the unit meeting activities we had a torch

light tour, made tent theatres (the scenery for a fairy tale or play) and made a home for a hedgehog. We finished the term with Easter crafts.

The summer term brought us the Fifty Challenge badge to celebrate Leeds becoming a county area. There were five challenges: Learn, Explore, Experience, Discover and Surprise

Challenges ranged from learning a skipping rhyme from fifty years ago, laying a trail for the unit to follow, flying a kite, making a boat that floats, painting to music, keeping a malteser on a straw for fifty seconds having an evening with no electricity or technology and making an edible bonfire.

One Challenge was to collect fifty items for the food bank. The Brownies did this by doing jobs at home and being paid with an item of food. This then grew as many of the Brownies then asked to do the Charity badge for the Take Action challenge and started the Take Action Challenges. The pack did their painting badge over three evenings which was enjoyed by everyone, making a mess and some beautiful abstract art created. Thanks to Geoff Swift for his donation of art paper.

In June, Donna, our Division Commissioner, came and presented four girls (Ava, Niamh, Iona and Alex), with their Silver badge for working through 4 Challenges, skill builders, interest badges and twelve hours of unit meeting activities. A great achievement for all the B

rownies.

We ended the summer term by having an evening of fun and games.

#### THE WORDS OF TWO UKRAINIAN REFUGEES

During our morning service on 25<sup>th</sup> June we heard a very moving account from a Ukranian refugee Titiana Bondarenko, who has settled in Edinburgh.

Her words were all the more moving because they were read by Karina, another Ukranian refugee who has settled in Otley.

These are Titiana's words.....

'The morning of February 24, 2022 forever changed the lives of my people. A full-scale war was at our doorstep. The days of mourning, grief and despair had come. Days when you do not know what awaits you, days when all your plans are destroyed in an instant, days when you are constantly afraid for your loved ones, days when you can lose everything in an instant.

What can help in such a situation? Who can help in such a situation?

*I, probably like all people, experienced fear at the beginning of the war. On the first night, I didn't know how to go to bed. What awaited us? And the only thing that gave peace and hope was my Lord and faith in God, being in God's love! Perhaps I can say in the words of David, "Have mercy on me, Lord, for I call on You every day." It was prayer and hope in God that supported me.* 

"For You, O Lord, are good and merciful and have great mercy on all who call on You." (v5).

If you have a day of sorrow today, call the Lord into your life and entrust your life to the Lord! "For you are great and do wondrous things; you alone are God" (v10).

Titiana continues.....

I am from Odessa, Ukraine. I moved to Edinburgh in May 2022 due to the war in my country. My son and daughter-inlaw remained in Ukraine, as well as some of my friends. In Edinburgh, God gave me a wonderful family that took me in, as well as a wonderful church called Bellevue Chapel! I am very grateful to the Lord for His support and hope! Imagine a desert. Wherever you look, all you can see is sand everywhere. There are no trees or any other vegetation, except for dry bushes. The sun burns everything that tries to grow, and you have a long road ahead through this parched land. There is nothing suitable to shelter you from the heat, there is not a single source of water along the road, only what you have taken with you. You are alone; it's just you and a boy – the son you are responsible for. There is not a single other person around who could offer you help. You wander in a direction unknown to you, no destination, not knowing where to turn, just wandering, hoping for safety. The situation is dire. What could be worse than this?

Many Ukrainians have found themselves in this situation during the war. You're running from danger, but you don't know where to run to. In your hands is a single suitcase, which now holds all your life's belongings. And sometimes you don't even have a suitcase – I did not have time to collect it. In your hands are the hands of your children. Who will help? Where to run to? Where can you expect help to come from? Everything around is new and unfamiliar. There are people around, but it is as if you are in a desert. Only you and your problems and no-one who could help!

Titiana concludes....

'This is my God, the God in whom I believe! The God who knows all my difficulties and experiences, who does not leave me alone, but empathises and helps me! This is the God who gives hope, and gives life! In the most difficult moments of my life, my Lord supported me and gave me hope!

At the beginning of the war, I came across one expression that encouraged me:

"When I die, I will be with the Lord! If I live, the Lord will be with me. Live or die, I belong to the Lord!"

Call the Lord into your life!

And then you can say, "You are the God who sees me! You are the God who saves me!"'

Again Titiana's words were the more powerful because they were read by Karina - and the whole congregation were moved.

Karina also gave a short account of her journey from Ukraine to Otley -



and paid tribute to her host Dr Verity Spencer (pictured with Karina).
