

Messenger letter

Dear Friends,

I am a great fan of Radio Four's 'Any Questions' which is broadcast on a Friday evening. The programme is an hour of lively topical debate with a panel of politicians and leading figures in our public life responding to questions from the public. What is perhaps of more interest is 'Any Answers' which is broadcast after the repeat of 'Any Questions' on a Saturday afternoon. This is an opportunity for the public to ring up and share their thoughts on the topical issues of the day. I find this a fascinating programme as I hear not only views that I agree with but also views that I do not agree with, and the latter challenges me significantly!

We can rejoice that we live in a society where this sort of discourse is possible. We live in a Parliamentary democracy with an adversarial House of Commons at its heart, a space where opposing views literally come face to face! We are also members of a Christian denomination which puts the voice of her members at its heart. The Church Meeting is an opportunity for Church members to express their views about the life of the faith community to which they belong. Of course, we do not gather to seek a democratic outcome but a theocratic one, we gather to discern the will of God! It is not only the responsibility of Elders to lay matters before the Church Meeting for its consideration, but members are also encouraged to do so as well! That is why Church membership matters! We are, sadly, better at the first one than the latter.

As I write this letter I am wondering if this magazine could be a space where the views of our Church fellowship are also

shared. This is the 708th edition of The Messenger and it stretches back longer than I know, although Andrew Howard will know! I imagine if we looked through the previous 707 editions, we would discover much discussion about how the Church should serve, worship, witness, and survive! In the United Reformed Church, we have thirteen synods, and it is often said that those thirteen synods produce fourteen different ways of doing things! Could this magazine be a place where different thoughts, views and understandings of faith are shared? If you think that you could write this opening letter I would be delighted to hear from you. We all have views about how faith shapes our lives, and how our lives shape the world, why not share them with your fellow members as I do in every edition? We are a community of believers and your opinions and thoughts about faith and its implications are as important as mine!

At the Church Meeting on 23rd November, we will discuss the future of The Messenger. What should it look like, what do you want to see included in it? Who contributes to it . . . could it be you? Perhaps this magazine could be a place where our understandings of faith, and its implications for our lives, are shared by many so that this space becomes a reflection of our fellowship's rich diversity. Please give it some prayerful thought and I look forward to hearing from you!

Faith in the City a challenge to the Church

On a December Sunday in 1985, I was walking to church in East Greenwich and stopped off to purchase a news paper, the headline on the Sunday Times was *Church Report Marxist*. This was a shock to me, I had read the report prior to publication which was due on the following Tuesday. The report *Faith in the City*, was addressed to the Church of England and had been commissioned by the Archbishop of Canterbury. In the light of this factor the headline was something of a shock.

Its content was a critical analysis of the social problems of urban communities across the country. It was the work of a Commission of leading Anglicans, including the Bishop of Liverpool David Sheppard, it was chaired by a retired civil servant, Sir. Richard O' Brien and had both theological and academic advisors.

Many things the report might be, Marxist was not one of them. It contained a critical analysis of the social problems of cities and inner urban areas, these included endemic poverty, poor housing conditions and numerous other social problems. All of which the Old Testament prophets would have spoken against. Indeed the teaching of Jesus in Luke 4 and Matthew 25 to identify only two examples are indicative of the importance of the voice of prophecy even in 1985 and 2025.

The report was substantial with 38 recommendations to the Church and 23 to the Government. The headline in the Sunday Times as might be expected created a furore, which in many ways gave the findings greater traction than would have been the case. The report is of course dated and today's society, whilst having similar social problems, requires analysis that is appropriate for our time.

To celebrate the $40^{\rm th}$ anniversary of its publication, I with my friend Dr Joe Forde are publishing in July 'Celebrating 40 years of Faith in the City'. (Sacristy Press). A collection of essays that both look back to 1985 along side essays that describe the ministry of churches that meet and challenge today's social problems.

The Church that is all Churches are called to be active in working for the Common Good, in so doing following the prophets and the teaching of Jesus.

Faith in the City addressed issues of the mid 80's, we all need to be interested and committed to working to create a just society in 2025.

SUPPER CLUB



On 3rd September, the Church remembers St Gregory the Great (540 – 604AD), one of the most important popes and influential writers of the Middle Ages. He is well worth remembering, because he also changed the course of history in the British Isles. The son of a very rich Roman senator, Gregory converted as a young man, and then sold his vast estates to found six monasteries in Sicily and a seventh in Rome. He gave generously to the poor and became a monk.

Christians in England owe him a great deal. When Gregory came across some English slaves for sale in Rome, he asked who they were, and was told, "They are Angles." Moved with compassion for these despised men, he replied, "They are not Angles, but angels!" He planned to go to England to evangelize the Angles, but plague broke out in Italy about 590, and during this time he was elected Pope. But Gregory did not forget the Angles. In 596 He sent Augustine to England, and so indirectly became the apostle of the English.

NEW RECYCLING OPPORTUNITY IN OTLEY



A message from the Bridge Church Environment Officers

For most of us taking medicines, either prescribed or over the counter, is part of everyday life and many of them come in blister pack packaging.

This packaging is made of plastic and foil and cannot typically be recycled through household or kerbside collections. However, Boots have now introduced a scheme whereby it can be taken into their stores to be recycled.

After blister packs have been deposited at Boots stores, they are sent to MYGroup who separate the plastic and foil. The recycled foil can be immediately re-used and the plastic is turned into a material called MYBoard TM which has a wide range of uses such as playground equipment and construction materials.

Boots in Otley is one of the participating stores and if you have an Advantage Card you can track your recycling.

Do you enjoy a cuppa? How do you like it – with sugar? Strong? With milk?

Apart from water, tea is the world's most popular drink. However, it is more than a drink, it's a daily ritual, a comfort, enjoyed during a break or while catching up with loved ones. In Britain we drink over 100 million cups of tea every day!

However, behind every cuppa lies an untold story – the people who carefully pick the tea leaves and carry up to 30 kilograms on their backs at a time. They face poverty, unsafe working conditions and climate change, leaving them unable to plan for their future.

hen the family farm began struggling, Blessings' husband moved to the city to find work.

"Things were hard," remembers Blessings. "We were living hand-to-mouth and had to wait for provisions to be sent from my husband. I found life really tough – doing everything on my own, trying to get something out of the land in drought. When I managed to harvest something, I couldn't get decent prices."

Blessings tells how things changed for herself and the wider community with the coming of BRACT, a Commitment for Life sponsored project in Zimbabwe. "The project taught us about disaster risk management, and this helped us plan what we need to do in case of droughts and even price fluctuations. The 'climate smart' agriculture training made us realise we can use less fertilisers, farm without cattle



to help us plough and still get a harvest even when the rainfall is low. We can also grow feed for our livestock in our fields and make hay for the cattle and goats. This was all completely
