Canon Paul Hardingham who writes for Parish Pump (a resource the Church subscribes to) is currently writing short articles on different books from the Bible. He is currently writing about the Gospels - the first is published below.

An Introduction to the Gospel of Matthew

This month we look at Matthew, the first of the gospels. Although linked to Matthew the apostle, it is generally believed that the author used oral tradition, written fragments, eye-witness accounts, as well as common material in the other synoptic gospels (Mark and Luke).

Matthew, in writing for Jews, sets out to prove that Jesus is the true Messiah. He connects Jesus' birth, life death and resurrection with the Old Testament Scriptures. In fact, he quotes the Old Testament more than any other New Testament author. This is reflected in the opening genealogy which traces Jesus back to Abraham; in his use of the terms *kingdom of heaven* and *Father in heaven*, reflecting a Jewish reluctance to use God's name; and in the way he portrays Jesus as the *Son of David*.

The whole gospel is structured around five blocks of teaching (chapters 5-7; 10; 13; 18; 24-25). This fivefold division reflects the structure of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament).

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives (work, family, friends and future) completed in Him. At the end of his gospel, Matthew records Jesus' commission to His disciples share this good news, promising to be with them:

'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (28:18-20)

GETTING TO KNOW ALAN ANSLOW

How long have you been associated with Otley?

I remember coming to Otley as a child most Sundays with my parents and grandparents; we always used to go to Hartley's Café on Boroughgate (which some members may remember). I then bought a house in Otley in 1983 and moved to Germany to work in 1985, where I met Alison (and married in Edinburgh) and we returned here in 1989. So really have had an association with Otley for the vast majority of my life.



What first brought you to the Bridge Church?

When we moved to Otley in 1989, Alison had been brought up in the Church of Scotland she sought advice and was told that the URC was the nearest denomination to the Church of Scotland. My faith journey has been varied to say the least, being baptised Methodist, confirmed in the Church of England, married Church of Scotland and now URC.

Please share a favourite memory of the Bridge Church?

A bit of a selfish one this! I would have to say the day that the new sanctuary doors were formally opened, which for me was a culmination of years of effort and frustration.

What is your favourite hymn and why?

There are several, but I would plump for one that is not sung in Church very often and that is 'Jerusalem'. I love the tune and find the words very uplifting. Another favourite is 'How Great Thou Art'.

What hobbies do you have?

I love sports particularly both codes of rugby (I am a season ticket holder at Leeds Rhinos) and cricket, purely spectating now as my very unsuccessful playing days are long gone. I also like running and regularly attend a weekly Parkrun. I also enjoy longish (but not too hilly) walks in the countryside with Alison!

Where is your favourite place in this country?

Alison would probably say that it was Headingley Stadium! Joking aside, I really like anywhere with beautiful scenery particularly the Lake District, Yorkshire Dales, Northumberland and Scotland.

Where in the world would you like to visit?

I would love to go to New Zealand and it is something we will probably look into in the near future. We will probably wish to drop in on a few places enroute.

If you could invite 3 people to dinner (dead or alive) who would they be and why?

A difficult one, but think I would plump for Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King Jr. and Kevin Sinfield. All were inspirational leaders in their particular field and in the case of the latter someone I consider to be a perfect role model for any young person to aspire to due to the way he conducts himself and the selflessness and great humility that he has shown.
